Our new approach to impact will see us work in partnership with Children's Health Queensland to prioritise funding that supports the greatest areas of need.

Create an environment where children and families feel connected, safe, empowered and nurtured



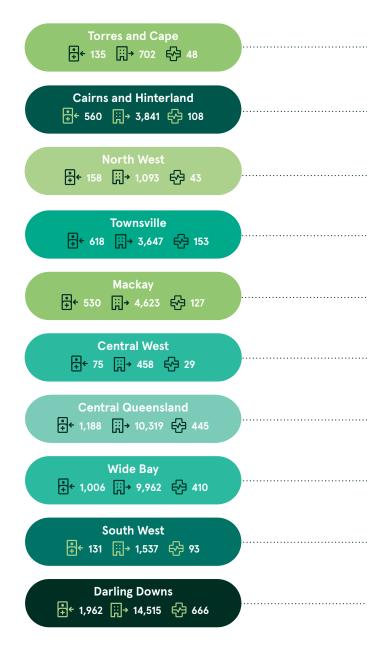


Here for every child from the Cape to the Tweed

Right now, one in three children at Queensland Children's Hospital comes from outside of greater Brisbane.

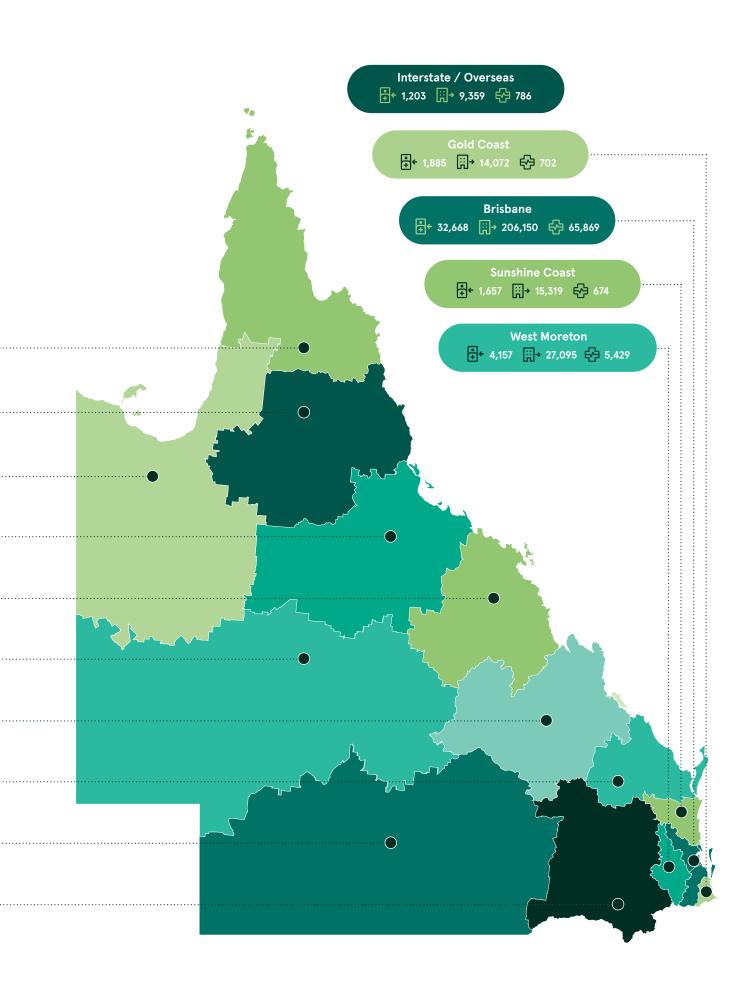
As our state continues to grow, so does the demand on our healthcare system. Queensland Children's Hospital has seen a 27% increase in demand for care since 2020.

Breaking down barriers with Transport to Treatment

A new initiative is paving the way for better access to healthcare for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and families, thanks to people like you.

In partnership with Children's Health Queensland, we are helping to ensure that transport is never a barrier to life-saving care through the newly launched Transport to Treatment program.

Transport to Treatment provides culturally safe and reliable transport to First Nations families accessing care at Queensland Children's Hospital through a free bus service.

Right now, 12% of First Nations patients in the Children's Health Queensland network miss medical appointments – over double the rate of non-Indigenous patients – mainly due to transport challenges.

By improving access to medical appointments, this program helps to prevent avoidable hospital admissions and improve long-term health outcomes for First Nations children.

To make this possible, Children's Hospital Foundation funded three dedicated, culturally safe buses and a 0.5 full-time equivalent staff support. The program launched in Brisbane, with plans to expand to Cairns, Rockhampton and Mackay in the coming years.

130,000 moments of connection and support

Because of you, our Impact Programs at Queensland Children's Hospital supported over 130,000 interactions with young patients and their families last financial year.

In a family's toughest moments, our team place children at the centre of their hospital experience. Through the delivery of our Impact Programs, we help create a safe space and offer joyful moments that nurture connection, empower families and bring moments of happiness to the hospital.

More than 90% of families who engage in our programs and services reported feeling better supported and more connected in their child's care journey.

Day in the life of our new Family Concierge



This year, we launched our Family Concierge role to enhance the delivery and effectiveness of our Impact Programs at Queensland Children's Hospital. This important role connects families to our in-hospital programs and services, helping to relieve fear and uncertainty.

Inpatient admissions can come with a significant fear of the unknown, as families are thrust into unfamiliar environments, navigating complex medical terms and treatment options.

In response to feedback from families, our Family Concierge program was designed to address the need for:

- Access to food for caregivers and families
- More support for caregivers unable to leave the bedside
- More distraction and connection for children unable to leave their rooms
- Difficulty navigating the hospital and support services
- Timeliness of response to non-clinical requests.

Families now have the support of a friendly face to help them access information about entertainment and support services, connect them to food options or where to find things that are often forgotten in the rush to get to hospital.

Through providing this support, we can also help address some of the emotional needs and allow frontline workers to focus on delivering clinical care.

Our Family Concierge program has been made possible thanks to the generous support of Hyundai Help for Kids, who funded our first full-time concierge and helped launch the pilot year of the program.

Dropped off our Hush Pack and shampoo and conditioner for some much-needed rest and self-care



Lined up books from our Book Bunker library for recovery time



Booked Cuddle Care for postsurgery cuddles



Arranged a cozy quilt and pillowcase to warm up their hospital home



Provided information on our free FareShare frozen meals and other options to ensure access to free and nutritious food



Huge strides for our community

From marathon runners to firefighters turned cyclists, you continued to show up for sick kids in 2024/25. Thanks to our generous community, we can continue to invest in world-class care and support for Queensland kids, when and where it is needed most.





Gold Coast Marathon

Our Gold Coast Marathon supporters pounded the pavement for sick kids, raising an incredible \$93,423 for the Children's Hospital Foundation.

Among our top fundraisers were fatherson team Hans and John Zimnoch, who raised \$19,000 – the highest amount ever raised by two individuals in one of our peer-to-peer campaigns. Hans and John ran in memory of their beloved daughter and sister Natasha, who passed away from cancer 30 years ago in 1995.

We also thank Rebecca Wood, our peer-to-peer champion, and Alexander Gregg, who raised \$10,730 while preparing his son for a bone marrow transplant.

Bridge to Brisbane

This year, team Children's Hospital Foundation hit the streets for Bridge to Brisbane in a big way. Together, we raised almost \$91,000 for sick kids – our best result to date.

Max Shearer - who was diagnosed with a rare form of brain cancer when he was 10 - secured first place for overall fundraising for the event, raising \$13,100. Max ran his first ever Bridge to Brisbane while undergoing his second round of chemotherapy. Now at 22, he has raised more than \$150,000 for the Children's Hospital Foundation over the years.

Special mentions must also go to Team Trumps, The Gym Junkies and Rebecca Wood, who spent months at Queensland Children's Hospital with both her babies.

Bike 4 Burns

Rain, heat and hills did not stop our firefighters, police and paramedics from riding from Eidsvold to Brisbane, raising \$115,393 for young Queensland burns patients through Bike 4 Burns.

Since 2006, this passionate community has raised over \$1 million to support lifechanging burns treatment and recovery.

Thanks to them, we have funded new equipment like the CO₂ fractional laser to improve scarring and mobility, supported research into dressings that reduce pain and speed up healing and backed programs like the Striving Deadly Scar Camp NQ and Camp OZ – helping kids adjust to life after a burn injury.

Behind the scenes at the Queensland Children's Tumour Bank

Because of you, a tumour is not just a clinical problem

- it can be the beginning of a research solution.

With your support, we are funding vital work at the Queensland Children's Tumour Bank and the Children's Health Queensland Clinical Trials Laboratory Support to drive cancer breakthroughs here in Queensland and around the world.

Human cancer tissue samples, including solid tumours, blood and bone marrow, have long helped researchers gain a better understanding of how childhood cancer cells grow and develop.

Last year, your generosity helped to power two critical services to increase this knowledge, right here in Queensland:

- Queensland Children's Tumour Bank (QCTB): Queensland's only paediatric tumour bank, and one of the very few free tumour banks in Australia. QCTB samples help to advance cutting-edge research, molecular testing and personalised medicine to bring better treatments to children with cancer.
- **Children's Health Queensland Clinical Trials Laboratory Support (CTLS):** High-quality infrastructure and support for oncology and non-oncology clinical trials to expand opportunities for children with rare

Through deepening our understanding of childhood cancers and expanding access to clinical trials, you are helping to transform research into real-world outcomes.

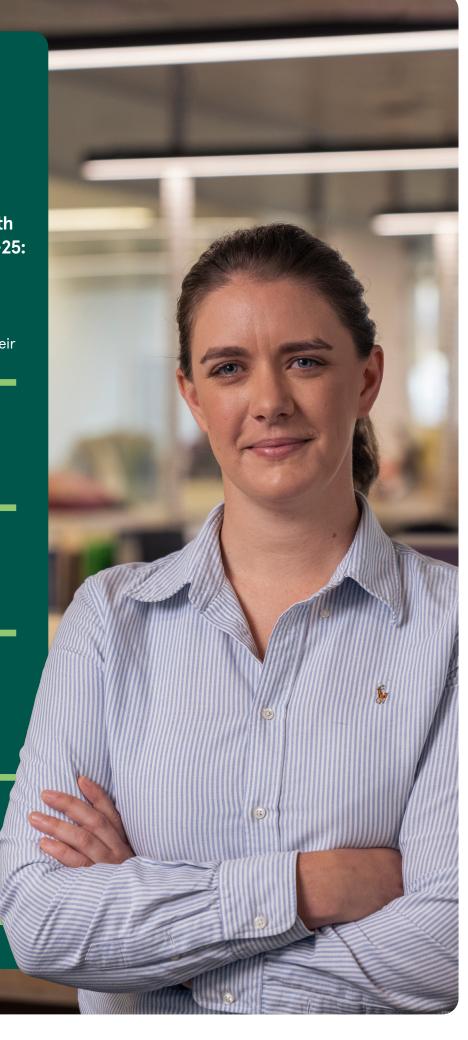

More than just music

This year, music therapy continued to provide comfort, connection and the chance to create lasting legacies for critically sick and injured children at Queensland Children's Hospital.

Patients and their families benefitted from music therapy during some of their most difficult times in 2024-25.

At Queensland Children's Hospital, music therapy can become something to hold onto for families – a bridge to connection when fear and anxiety feel overwhelming.

With your support, music therapy can ease their journey through reducing anxiety, pain and emotional distress during medical procedures, long hospital stays and palliative care.

Beyond relief, music can also profoundly aid rehabilitation.

A young patient who was admitted to the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU), with an acquired brain injury following a stroke, showed the extraordinary outcomes possible.

After two weeks in a coma, her rehabilitation was complex and daunting for her whole family. As she emerged from sedation, music therapy helped regulate alertness, encouraged meaningful interaction and supported physical rehabilitation through instrumental play.



Singing assisted vocal recovery, while songwriting provided a powerful outlet for emotional expression and coping. By the end of her admission, the patient had written a song that captured her identity and resilience within a challenging recovery journey.

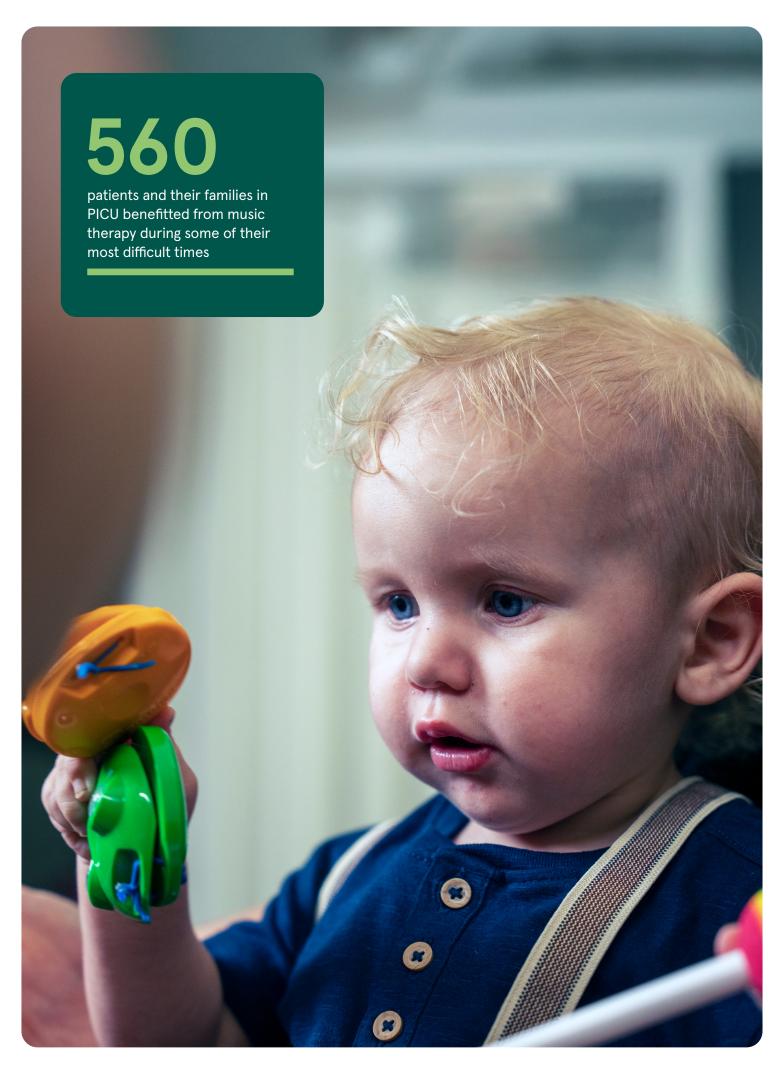

Children's Brain Cancer Centre breakthrough advances treatment options for kids with brain cancer



Thanks to your support, a world-first discovery - right here in Queensland - could change the future for kids with brain cancer.

Every year, hundreds of Australian families hear the words, "your child has brain cancer". It kills more Australian children than any other disease.

For the children who survive, standard treatments like surgery, radiation and chemotherapy have long-term impacts on their development and quality of life.

These children face challenges from cognitive impairments such as memory loss and learning difficulties to physical disabilities and emotional and psychological struggles.

But because of your generosity, this is beginning to change.

In a world-first study conducted right here in Queensland, researchers at the Children's Brain Cancer Centre have trialled a promising new drug known as CT-179.

When used in combination with radiation therapy, it has shown remarkable success in destroying tumour cells, delaying recurrence and improving survival outcomes in pre-clinical trials.

According to Children's Brain Cancer Centre Co-Director, Professor Bryan Day, "Our study demonstrated that the drug CT-179, used in combination with standard radiation therapy prolonged survival in a range of preclinical

medulloblastoma models, delayed recurrence of the disease and increased the effectiveness of radiotherapy."

This discovery is part of a groundbreaking collaboration between QIMR Berghofer, the University of Queensland and Children's Health Queensland, made possible by you.

"This research could lead to new combination therapies that are less toxic, more effective and offer better outcomes for young patients."

Our Sapphire Committee celebrated a major milestone this year, surpassing \$1 million raised and reaching a total of \$1.6 million raised since inception.

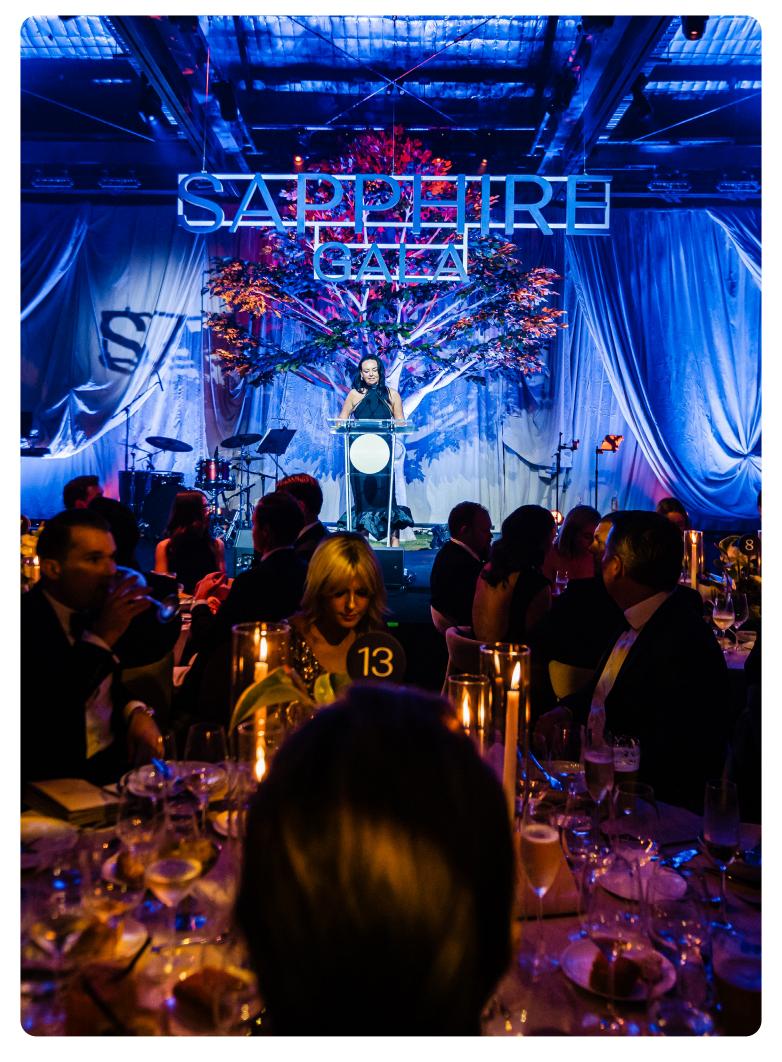
The Sapphire Committee is a dedicated group of modern philanthropists who generously volunteer their time and connections to raise funds to drive meaningful change for future generations.
